Our 5th Summer Genealogy Conference was held on Saturday, 7 July at McHenry County College in Crystal Lake. With 222 in attendance we showed a 24% increase over last year's registrations! 134 of this year's registrants had attended one of our previous conferences, while 88 of them attended for the first time. As a result, we have already seen an increase in new members to the organization.

Putting this event together is a challenge and could not happen without all of the hard work put forth by the entire conference committee. Over the course of several months, all worked many hours to organize the conference and to ensure its success. 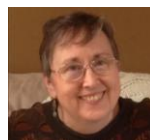

Iroquois Theater Fire 1903 - Chicago IL by Dolores Schutt

A first cousin twice removed of Peggy's and mine, Rena Knopp, along with her fiancé, Joseph McClelland attended a theater performance on December 30, 1903, at the Iroquois Theatre. They had just become engaged and this was to be an engagement celebration.

The theatre had opened in Nov. of 1903 and was considered the most modern in design and technology as well as 'absolutely safe'. It was a Christmas-New Year holiday weekend with mostly women and children in the packed overcrowded audience. A single spotlight started a small fire which erupted into an uncontrollable blaze that killed over 600 people including Rena and her fiancé.

The couple were brought back to their hometown of Harvard, IL. A double funeral was held, and was attended by an immense crowd. They are buried side by side in the Mt. Auburn Cemetery in Harvard. A large tombstone tells of the tragic death.

For more information on this tragedy the Harvard Diggins Library has a book titled "Tinderbox: The Iroquois Theatre Disaster of 1903" by Anthony Hatch.

She is not exactly a relative, but the divorced 3rd wife of Congressional Representative Benjamin Wood, elected from NY to the 37th and 38th Congress. Source: COX, Joseph A. (1964) "The Recluse of Herald Square". This book is really a wonderful read and a true story.

COX says - "Seventy-two years ago this week, on Dec. 6, 1932, the Boston Globe broke a startling story, an heiress found living in squalor as a recluse in a Manhattan hotel."

A fantastic hoax, her name and family cannot be explained or understood without reading the source materials, but here is at least part of the story.

RECLUSE, 93, HOARDING MILLION DEFIES TREASURE SEARCHERS

Rare Laces and Gems Found Hidden in Hotel Room

A frail but spirited little lady of 93 years, once the belle of mid Victorian days, today stomped her defiance of searchers spurred by discovery of nearly a million dollars in currency she hoarded in her hotel room "because she was afraid of banks." They found \$400,000 in a little paper bundle a few days ago. Now they have found a half million more in \$10,000 bills hidden within the folds of her voluminous dresses.

Rare laces, gems and period costumes that rate as museum pieces have been revealed in trunks within that same room in which Mrs. Ida E. WOOD had dwelt for many, many years.

Next week, trunks now in storage will be searched for possible rare treasures such as have been revealed daily hidden away in rubbish, under carpets, within mattresses and bed clothing and in her own garb of a mode a half century old.
