Cook County Social Worker for the Unclaimed Dead

Rebeca Perrone, the Cook County Medical Examiner's first indigent coordinator, handles 700+ cases a year in her role as a Social Worker for the dead. Using a list of names of unclaimed remains, Rebeca searches for potential next of kin, hoping to reunite them with their loved ones. Her stories reflect how basic genealogy techniques can be used to find living relatives.

Rebeca started in the ME job in 2015, after local media exposed the backlog of bodies literally piling up at the morgue. Now, with Rebeca's help, many of these forsaken individuals will have the dignity of a proper burial or casting of ashes; estranged family and friends can also find closure.

Originally from Algonquin, Rebeca studied sociology and criminal justice at Loyola University. She later worked for the Indiana Department of Child Services, investigating abuse and neglect claims. A part of her longed to be a detective, but not necessarily a police officer. Her new position with the Cook County ME's office now affords her the opportunity to bring together her investigative skills and compassion for others.

Come join us for what promises to be a fascinating evening of stories and research tips!

We need your help to write a tagline or slogan to help others realize that MCIGS is open to everyone, not just those with McHenry County ancestors. To make this fun we have developed a contest. The details are below.

Goal: Identify a phrase to be included in MCIGS publicity which makes it clear that meeting topics are not focused only on McHenry County genealogy research.

Rules:

1. Tagline should be a short phrase which incorporates the idea that MCIGS is not just for those researching in McHenry County.
2. The contest is open to both members and non-members.
3. Tagline must be original, that is, not used by any other genealogical organization.
4. There is no limit to the number of taglines that someone may submit.

8. In case of duplicates, the submission received at the earlier date/time will be the one considered.

10. One prize of a free registration to the **13 July 2019** conference will be awarded.
11. The decision of the contest committee will be final.

New Genealogical Materials Acquired

Nathan Dylan Goodwin has sent his newest publication, *The Wicked Trade and The Suffragette's Secret*, to MCIGS as he has done with all his previous books. This volume contains both a short story of 100 pages and a full-sized book of 350 pages. Both tales are based on Morton Farrier, a British genealogist who has starred in all Goodwin's fiction books. *The Suffragette's Secret* is a story about the women involved in working towards voting rights in 1910 England. Morton's goal was to research his wife's ancestors which has led him back to this women's movement.

The Wicked Trade is based on the history of smuggling in England. Morton has been hired to research the people involved in these crimes. Chapters go back and forth from present time to the early 1820's detailing the work of the key characters while keeping readers updated on Morton's personal life.

As in all Goodwin's books, Morton Farrier's family is always an interesting thread. In order to follow Morton's life, the books are best read in order of publication, beginning with *Hiding the Past*. However, Goodwin alludes to Morton's past family adventures in each of his books so one could enjoy each book independently. This new publication will be placed in the Crystal Lake Public Library where all the Morton Farrier series books are located. The book will be allowed to circulate.

MCIGS has received a very generous gift from one of our members, Larry Wood. Larry has written 5 volumes of his family history which he had donated to MCIGS. Family genealogies include Wood, Campbell, Crandall, Dunkle, and Papierski. The volumes were accompanied by a flash drive containing everything from copies of letters requesting information to maps, photos, wills, etc. These volumes will be placed in the McHenry Public Library. Anyone researching their family would do well to review some of Larry's writings to see how a family history could be documented in an interesting and usable way.

We remain steadfast in our commitment as an organization to providing a platform for members to share their stories and research with the wider community. We believe this can be accomplished by publishing these articles on our website through a blog. This format will allow readers to interact with the content through comments, and have access to articles throughout the year. It will also provide a way for us to share "This and That" genealogy news in a timelier fashion.

In order for this new format to be a success, we will need your help. Do you have a research story you would like to share? How about old photographs or family recipes? Would you be willing to provide a biographical sketch of an ancestor? We are still in need of your content which can be submitted via e-mail at mcigs@mcigs.org. Additionally, if you have experience blogging and would like to get involved with this exciting new project, please reach out to us at the same address.

We anticipate the new blog will be accessible to the public and not necessarily exclusive to only members. What will be exclusive to members, however, is the entire digital archive of MCIGS Connection Quarterly back issues from 1983-2016! We have already digitized the first 20 years and are working to make that content available to our members online in the coming months.

We are also seeking volunteers to help us finish compiling a master surname index for the complete run of the publication. You need not live locally to participate in this project.
