Telling the Story with Maps: Maps of Early Illinois and Where to Find Them presented by Ginger Frere, Thursday, 12 November 2020, 7 p.m.

Maps can convey immense detail. They can provide the names of places, distances, topography, geographical features, migration routes, land ownership, boundaries and political jurisdictions. Maps allow us to see the physical relationship between places and they can help us answer questions – how did our ancestors get from one place to another? Where might they have gotten married? Maps can help us tell a story – Here's where our ancestors lived in relation to the Great Chicago Fire.

Ginger Frere, MLIS, MBA, is a professional researcher who provides a variety of research services to authors, professional historians, film makers and individuals interested in genealogy. Her primary research interests include Chicago history and the creation of <u>online</u> tools for genealogists. She was one of the driving forces behind the development of <u>Chicago Ancestors.org</u>.

In addition to researching, Ginger is a frequent speaker in the Chicago-land area and a regular instructor in Chicago's Newberry Library Adult Education seminar program. She is also a Newberry Scholar-in-Residence.

Ginger has attended the <u>National Institute on</u>
<u>Genealogical Research (NIGR)</u> as well as
the Genealogical Research Institute of Pittsburgh.

Ginger is a member of the <u>Chicago Genealogical</u> <u>Society</u>, the <u>Illinois State Genealogical Society</u>, and the National Genealogical Society.

An ordinance designed to give the City of Harvard more latitude over quarantine regulations was introduced at the last meeting. The regulations would allow police to arrest and the courts to punish those who did not comply with the ordinance. The vote was tabled until the next meeting.

He is survived by his wife and his children: Maude Hayden, Mrs. James Gleason, Mrs Alvin Cooke, John, William and Mark, all of Harvard; Mrs Fred Keene, Fred, Dominic and Vincent Sullivan of Chicago and Mrs Lee Dondanville, Serene, IL. He is also survived by a brother, Judge John J Sullivan of Omaha, Nebraska and a sister, Mary Shields of Harvard. Burial was in St. Joseph's Cemetery.

#### Did You Know?

Reclaim the Records began about five years ago, as ..."a new not-for-profit activist group of genealogists, historians, researchers, and open government advocates." They have sued a number of government agencies to obtain the indexes and in some cases, the actual records. Take a look at their website to see what they are working on and what they have accomplished; there maybe something there for you. https://www.reclaimtherecords.org/

One of the most sought after group of records are historical newspapers. There are many pay sites – Newspapers.com, GenealogyBank, Newspaper Archive, but there are free ones. If you Google "list of online newspaper archives " you will find a list of newspapers from around the world, or use this link:

Some are free, some are pay sites, some are indexes only. Every newspaper on the Fulton Post Card site is listed. Some newspapers are listed from the site that holds them. If the paper you want is not available through online, you can always contact the library in your research area. If they don't have them, they will know where you might find what you need. Some library sites have an "Ask Me" link and you can ask there or telephone them.
